The Midwest Association of Housing Cooperatives, Inc. is a nonprofit charitable regional organization dedicated to assisting members and directors of Housing Cooperatives. We are a 501 C3 charitable organization.

Conferences are an important function of the Midwest Association of Housing Cooperatives. The conferences serve as one of our primary tasks as stated in our mission statement.

To support and champion the cause of quality housing through education, legislative actions, partnership, and advocacy for housing cooperatives

A cooperative is a group of people working together in a joint economic activity that is owned and operated by its members for their mutual benefit. In a housing cooperative (or co-op), a housing development is jointly operated by its members. They own membership certificates in the corporation, giving them the right to occupy a dwelling unit and participate in the operations of the corporation. The cooperative housing corporation owns the total property. A not-for-profit corporation.

A cooperative is a business controlled by the people who use it. It is a democratic organization whose earnings and assets belong to its members. By patronizing and becoming an active member of a co-op, you invest yourself with the power to shape that business. You control the politics and economics of what is truly your organization.

MAHC offers a regular program of the finest in Cooperative Education available throughout the United States. MAHC also offers the following services to cooperatives skills Development Courses , Seminars , Newsletters , Publications, Consultation , A Speaker's Bureau , Representation , Network Opportunities, and Training Conferences.

MAHC sponsors an Annual conference in May each year.

MAHC membership is centered in Michigan, Illinois, Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky, Wisconsin, Minnesota and throughout the Midwest, but is not limited to the region. Many member cooperatives are from non-Midwestern towns.

What is MAHC?

A non-profit, tax exempt, organization whose purpose is the education of members and directors of housing cooperatives.

MAHC PROVIDES

NEWSLETTER: The quarterly newsletter provides timely informative articles from the “how to” of problem solving to analysis of new legislation. Also includes information regarding upcoming events and answers to member’s questions.

GROUP ACTION: With membership exceeding 20,000 units of cooperative housing, MAHC represents a growing force of influence on issues, concerns and legislation affecting our cooperative community.

CONSULTATION: MAHC board members, professional advisors, and staff are available to deliver training, mediate board disputes, and to provide consulting services on a variety of cooperative matters.

TASK FORCE WORKSHOPS: Skill development workshops have been designed by MAHC, with the assistance of others including the Organization of Applied Science in Society. These one and two day seminars provide comprehensive coverage of topics including Membership Selection, Financial Management, Evaluating Management, Cooperative Communications, Serving on the Board, Membership Orientation, Introduction to Co-ops, Management Contracts, and many more.

CO-OP HOUSING HANDBOOK: MAHC publishes the Cooperative Housing Handbook (frequently referred to as the “Co-op Bible”) This handbook is a must for all those involved in the production, governance, management, or routine operations of a housing cooperative. Originally published through a grant from the Ford Foundation and revised in 2015

TELEPHONE SUPPORT: Looking for support? A quick telephone call to the MAHC office can save you hours of research time. Our staff and volunteers are able to answer questions regarding specific cooperative issues or to refer you to the proper source for accurate information.

NETWORKING: MAHC responds to inquiries from individuals seeking to move into a housing cooperative by providing a list of our members in the identified area. Our conferences are attended by cooperators throughout the country, and provide an opportunity to meet and learn from fellow cooperators as well as noted professionals.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE & VENDORS: In direct correlation with our mission statement MAHC holds an annual conference every spring. In addition to our unique workshops and certification, there is a vendor show which allows vendors cooperative board members and attendees to speak face to face with vendors who understand what it takes to work with housing cooperatives. The conference provides a excellent opportunity to network with other cooperative members, boards and cooperative professionals.

MAHC Conference

The MAHC Annual Conference is the nation's best gathering of cooperative housing leaders. Our conferences are designed for those whose mission is to strengthen cooperative housing and the people they serve. During three days in late May , cooperative housing professionals from across the country will convene to take advantage of educational and networking opportunities and share experiences, challenges, solutions, and successes.

Participants engage in peer-to-peer educational sessions and learn from national experts on programs and policies to help cooperative housing members. Past conferences have resulted in new and increased collaboration, new approaches, and improved practices across the nation.

History of MAHC

First Meetings

1963 Cadillac Hotel, Detroit, Michigan 13 or 14 people from that many Cooperatives met to be heard. Many cooperatives had not reached endorsement stage but had many unanswered questions. Decided no formal organization, but established Newsletter with Dos and Don'ts of running the day-to-day operation within the housing cooperative.

First Conference

1963, Cobo Hall, Detroit, Michigan. Two meetings held and the suggestion for a formal organization came forth -- MAHC --the Michigan Association of Housing Cooperatives. Overwhelming response by cooperators to create a formal organization to represent people.

MAHC the early years

In early 1964, the Foundation for Cooperative Housing, FCH, became involved in the Michigan Association of Housing Cooperatives. The Michigan Association had little difficulty securing and maintaining a membership since FCH would build Association dues directly into new cooperative's initial budgets.

The first few years were dominated by FCH involvement; in 1971 the situation was changed through the efforts of various co-op boards. An active campaign resulted in the majority of the board becoming housing cooperators.

MAHC Changes its name

In 1973, the Association broadened its scope and changed its name to the Midwest Association of Housing Cooperatives when Eden Green Cooperative from Chicago, Illinois joined the organization. The Board of Directors of the Midwest Association of Housing cooperators was made up of 15 housing cooperators or 12 housing cooperatives with 3 professional or individual positions.

MAHC as a leader in education and a resource center

In April 1974, MAHC leaders went to Washington, D.C. to take part in the National Conference On Cooperative Housing, which was developed by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), and the National Association of Housing-Cooperatives (NAHC), and the Organization for Applied Science in Society (OASIS). The meeting encouraged all programs in cooperative housing to present a slate of current problems for possible problem solving and solution.

MAHC has been recognized as one of the Nation's leaders in training, education, and support services for Housing Cooperatives
